## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### COVID19

We have had quite a large number of staff and students testing positive to COVID, with some being quite unwell. The current guidelines for those testing positive is to isolate for a minimum of 5 days and not attend school until their symptoms have resolved. Students who isolate as a result of a positive COVID-19 test will be supported in the same way as students with an extended absence due to illness or injury, with learning materials provided to support their continued learning.

If students become unwell at school and present to Sick Bay, we will contact parents and your son/daughter will need to be collected.

#### State Budget

The Victorian State Budget was handed down last week, with more investment in education by the Andrews Labor Government.

While no further funding was allocated to Oberon High School, there was funding for the early planning of another secondary school on the Mt Duneed Estate side of Armstrong Creek. This would most likely mean that another Secondary School is planned to come online around 2028.

#### **Year 7 Enrolments 2024**

We have begun receiving Grade 6 applications from the Primary Schools and are verifying that students are living at the address that we have been provided. This is a necessary requirement as DET have directed me to only enrol students who reside in the school zone or have siblings at the school. This is due to the population growth that is occurring within our enrolment zone.

### **Mobile Phones**

The policy around mobile phones in schools hasn't changed for a number of years. Therefore, mobile phones and associated devices are banned from all State Schools during the school day.

Students will be required to switch off their phones and store them securely in lockers from the start of the school day until the final bell. If an emergency occurs, Parents or Guardians can reach their child by calling the school General Office.

The school mobile phone policy can be found on the school website.

#### **Student Attitudes to School Survey**

The Attitude to School Survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education to assist schools to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, resilience, bullying, health and wellbeing, physical activity, and life in general. Students will have the opportunity to complete this survey by Friday 9<sup>th</sup> June.

#### **Report Writing Day**

The school has a planned for a scheduled student free day on Friday  $9^{th}$  June. The focus of this day is on reporting writing.

## **Ensuring Cyber Safety: Practical Tips for Parents**

In today's digital age, ensuring the cyber safety of our children is of utmost importance. They specialize in handling such cases and can take appropriate action. Report instances of cyberbullying targeting children or young people, as well as image-based abuse involving non-consensual sharing of intimate images or videos. Harmful content can appear as posts, comments, texts, messages, chats, livestreams, memes, images, videos, or emails, transmitted through various platforms.

- Reporting to the eSafety Commission contributes to a safer online environment.
- 5. **Block the offending user:** Utilise the blocking feature available on social media platforms to prevent further interaction with the person responsible for the inappropriate content.
- Report to social media providers: If the content violates the terms of use of a specific social media platform, report it to the provider (e.g., Facebook). They have mechanisms in place to remove content that contravenes their quidelines.
  - **Attend eSafety Webinars for Parents:** To enhance your knowledge about cyber safety and digital parenting, consider participating in the eSafety Commission's webinars. They offer practical tech tips, conversation starters, and invaluable advice for parents and carers of young people in primary and secondary school. The webinars are designed to empower you with the necessary tools and understanding to navigate the digital world alongside your children. ### **VCE OUTDOOR AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES - GRAMPIANS CAMP**

On the 16<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> May, our Unit 3 Outdoor and Environmental Studies class participated in an adventurous journey in the magnificent Grampians National Park. The Grampians is known as '*Gariwerd'* to the Djab Wurrung and Jardwardjali, it's traditional custodians of over 20,000 years.

Our first day began with a 10 km bushwalk through the heart of the central Grampians. Starting from the Wonderland area, we traversed past Splitter Falls, up through Silent Street and on to the renowned Pinnacle. The breathtaking views from the summit were well worth the effort. We continued our walk throughout the afternoon, arriving to our camp at the base of Mt Rosea, where students enjoyed the peaceful surrounds and natural beauty of Stony Creek Campground.

Rock climbing at The Bundaleer on the second day of camp was a thrilling experience. Students challenged themselves across a few different top rope climbs, including a chimney climb which involved climbing a vertical opening between two slabs of rock. There were some 'interesting' techniques displayed, proving it doesn't matter how you get there, rather the journey you take. Students also tested their nerves with a 20 meter abseil before taking on the more daring 60-meter abseil.

Thursday brought us new horizons as we set out on a canoeing adventure across Lake Bellfield. The paddling experience offered a serene connection with nature and allowed us to witness the beauty of the Grampians (Gariwerd) from a unique perspective. In the afternoon, our explorations continued with a shorter 4.8 km walk from the historical Zumsteins site to Fish Falls. This picturesque waterfall cascades 60 meters over terraced rocks.

The last day of our journey led us to the Bunjil shelter, a sacred rock art site nestled within the Black Range Scenic Reserve. This ancient shelter holds significant cultural importance, depicting the Aboriginal creator spirit, Bunjil. It was a humbling experience for our students as they learned about the rich cultural heritage of the land they were exploring. This Camp has allowed to students to create some wonderful memories and learn some valuable lessons about themselves, others and the environment. The Grampians has truly been a playground for adventure, a sanctuary for nature lovers, and a gateway to indigenous heritage.

I would like to extend my appreciation to the other staff Sean Fitzgerald and Rob Neal, along with the students who made this Camp a memorable experience.





There may be no psychological condition more controversial and provocative than ADHD. At one extreme, we see some people say it doesn't exist.Others say it's a result of poor parenting.

But for parents who are raising children with an ADHD diagnosis, their child's behaviour can seem like a wrecking ball.

In "A Parent's Guide to Raising a Child with ADHD ", Dr Justin



## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

#### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students
